MCAS has sponsored in-school programs in Fort Bragg, Mendocino and Point Arena elementary schools for the past few years. This year our roving teachers are Pam Huntley and Sherry Sellars, acclaimed by both parents and students for their ability to present nature and ecology subjects in a memorable and exciting way. We are now starting to sponsor Snowy Plover presentations to high school students through the California State Parks and Recreation Department – the teacher will be Angela Martin, and the sessions will include both classroom study and field trips. Welcome on board, Angela.

Pam Huntley, in addition to her teaching load is developing a series of Public Service Announcements (PSAs) for once-a-week presentation on “All Things Considered” on KZYX and Z. Each of these will highlight a specific bird species or ecological niche, giving a short look at interesting facts; Pam’s first three PSA pilots excited the MCAS Board – yes, we did learn from them! We will keep you updated on when to expect these interesting and informative PSAs.

We have received additional donations to our MCAS fund-raising drive. Gala April Dinner and Program

The Mendocino Coast Audubon Society is pleased to announce the details of its yearly South Coast dinner meeting. It is scheduled at the Gualala Art Center on Monday, April 17th, beginning with dinner at 6 pm. This year's caterer is Leslie Bates of Savory Coast Catering. She will be serving an Asian-themed three-course dinner accompanied by a choice of beverages. For a full description of the menu, see the enclosed salmon-colored reservation sheet.

At 7:30 pm, following a short business meeting, Richard Kuehn, a local birder and videographer, will present the program, Japan in Winter – Birding in the Land of the Rising Sun, a film he recently edited using his digital video footage and his domestic partner, Dean Schuler's, still digital images. Both men were members of a Field Guides Inc. <<http://www.fieldguides.com/>> trip to Japan during February 2003. They selected this trip as they are in the midst of attempting to photograph all 15 species of the Crane Family in the wild and knew several species from Europe and Asia often overwinter at the Crane Center in Izumi on Japan's third largest island, Kyushu. Amongst the many avian species in the film are 5 species of Crane. To prepare for their trip, they studied Japanese for 4 months under the tutelage of Akiko Docker, a native of Kyoto, Japan, who also lives at The Sea Ranch. This enabled them to travel by themselves for a couple of weeks, including to Yudanaka, where they photographed Japanese Macaques, Snow Monkeys, in thermal pools.

The suggested donation for the dinner and program is \$25, which will be accepted at the door. For those who cannot attend the dinner, the program only is optional for a suggested donation of \$5 at the door.

MCAS at the Whale Festivals

Once again, the Mendocino Coast Audubon Society will have a table at the Point Cabrillo Light Station for both the Mendocino and Fort Bragg Whale Festivals. We are talking to interested attendees, showing our storyboard of MCAS activities, and selling Mendocino County Bird Lists and our ever-popular Audubon Birds from Wild Republic.

David Jensen is also leading Audubon bird walks in the Point Cabrillo Preserve starting at 9:00 am on all four days of the festivals – meet at the Point Cabrillo parking lot.

Invasive Plant Removal

As is painfully obvious in driving Route One between Fort Bragg and Mendocino, we are in serious trouble from the spread of exotic plants, particularly gorse, broom, and pampas grass. Art Morley, Dick Van Alstyne and their crew of weed warriors have made an impressive dent in some areas, Ten-Mile Beach, Big River and Point Cabrillo Reservation in particular, but the weeds are spreading faster than this small team can handle them. **We need more help!** MCAS, teaming up with State Parks personnel, has scheduled a once-a-month weed removal day, the fourth Saturday of each month. Starting Saturday, March 24, at Jughandle State Reserve we will attack the weeds head-on – weed wrenches and instruction in their use will be supplied by State Parks. If you value the native California plants and want to preserve them, please join us at Jughandle at 9:00 am. Work as long as you please, but please work.

Healthier Pest Control

ONE: Practice Prevention

Pests, whether bugs, weeds, or other undesired organisms, are usually the symptom of a problem rather than the source --- prevent [problems that can lead to pest infestations.

- Remove potential pest hiding and breeding sites. Keep outdoor areas clear of trash and standing water. Keep indoor areas clean and dry.
- Keep your plants and soil healthy. Healthy plants can better resist, and recover from, pest damage. Plant native flowers, trees, shrubs and grasses to take advantage of their ability to thrive in your area.
- Make natural pest enemies welcome. Toads, dragonflies, lady beetles, bats, and numerous other species are natural allies in best control. Learn your allies and support them.
- Move a little higher --- a longer, thicker lawn will crowd out weeds.

TWO: Make Sure You Have a Problem

Seeing a bug or weed doesn't mean you have a "pest problem."

- Take the time to identify your "pest." Is it a beneficial or non-pest species?
- Reconsider what's a weed. Tolerate some plants other than grass. Allow naturally occurring plants to fill in problem spots. There are many low-growing wildflowers that can tolerate mowing and will add some diversity to your lawn area. Create a "mowed meadow."
- Pest control does not mean pest elimination. Realize that insects can live in your lawn and garden, and not cause damage. The mere presence of a potential pest species does not mean you have a problem. It must be abundant enough to cause damage. Is it?

WHALE FESTIVAL BIRD WALKS

The MCAS will hold two bird walks in conjunction with the Mendocino Whale Festival March 4 & 5. And two walks with the Fort Bragg Whale Festival March 18 & 19. Last year people, from 10 to their mid-70's, enjoyed seeing meadow larks, four different hawks and shore birds, too. Pelagic pigeon guillemots, which winter at sea and are only now coming to shore to nest were spotted.

By the Fort Bragg Whale Festival, in two weeks, the barn and violet green swallows will be back in the area.

It's a short and easy walk (down hill both ways) through the open headlands to **Point Cabrillo Lighthouse**. Join David Jensen for a closer look at coastal birds at **9:00 am both Saturday and Sunday, March 4 & 5th and again on March 18 & 19th**. Follow signs for the lighthouse posted on Hwy. One.

BIRD WALKS

There are two scheduled bird walks at the Botanical Gardens -- our regular bird walk on the **third Wednesday** of each month; meet at the **Botanical Gardens at 8:00 am**. The birding basics walk on the **first Saturday is at 9:00**.


